Specialized keyboards

A ZoomText large-print keyboard can be useful for employees with impaired or low vision. Or those who need extra space on the keyboard to accommodate physical issues.

A one-handed keyboard is useful for employees who are not able to use both hands for typing. This keyboard may increase function for those with medical conditions, including amputation, rheumatoid arthritis and orthopedic problems.
